While living on campus in the dorms, Mrs. Thomas will oversee the dorm life of the young ladies, which will give her opportunity to pass on her wealth of knowledge and experience in a practical setting. President Stox comments, "I am so thrilled to have a woman of Pat's stature here on campus to mentor our



young ladies. She will be a great asset to the college."

Mrs. Pat Thomas, widow of the late Dr. Roy Thomas, was reared in Hobbs, New Mexico. She was converted in 1954 at the only Free Will Baptist church in the state at that time. The young man who preached the sermon that day later became her husband, and they remained married for 48 years until his death in March, 2003. Through the years she has been a pastor's wife, mother, grandmother, home missionary, national woman's auxiliary officer, music teacher, publications editor and author.

While a student at Free Will Baptist Bible College she developed a desire to learn Free Will Baptist history. For over 30 years she studied and researched the lives of the great men and women who helped form our denomination. She authored the books, *The Journal Of Benjamin Randall*, and *David Marks: What A Preacher, What A Man*. She also authored the book on the life of her husband, *The Man From Idaho*. She served the National Home Missions Department for 25 years as editor of *Mission Grams*, which later became *Aim*. She wrote and published many home missions, soul winning and church growth materials during those years as publications editor.

She has been used extensively as a speaker at Bible colleges, churches, and

women's conferences all across America and on the mission fields. Some of her topics which have been published are: "How To Entertain Elegantly On A Shoe String Budget," "Decorating With A Flair," and "Going Soul Winning When You Are Scared To Death!" She has served many years as a wedding coordinator, floral arranger, and interior decorator.

Mrs. Thomas has reared two children who are both in full time Christian ministries. Her daughter, Patsy, is the wife of Rev. Howard Gwartney, who heads up the pastoral training department at Southeastern Free Will Baptist College. Her son, Mark, is pastor of the Highland Hills Free Will Baptist Church in Greeley, Colorado. Both children were reared on home missions fields, and both also went out as national home missionaries.

BIBLICAL ETHICS

DR. LORENZA STOX

For the past forty-one years I have been involved in some type of full-time Christian ministry. It all began at the age of twenty when I began pastoring a church in Tennessee. I've worked in various ministries of a number of churches: Principal/teacher; Music Director; Youth Director; Bus Routes. I was Dean of Southeastern for eight years.

During these years I've worked with a number of great men and pastors – each one different; and I learned much from each of them. One area of importance I observed and learned was in the area of ethics – doing what was ethical in various situations. Having been in the position I've been in for over a year now, I really feel a need to address this matter of ethics as it relates to us – pastors, leaders and co-workers.

One dictionary defines ethics as "the discipline dealing with what is good and bad or right and wrong or with much duty and obligation." I do believe we have a moral and Christian obligation to do what is right in every situation.

Throughout my ministry and especially in the last few

We have a moral and christian obligation to do what is right in every situation

months, I have seen good men accuse, judge and sentence other brothers without talking with them and giving them a fair hearing. Most times the judging and condemning is done on mere "hearsay." This is simply not right nor ethical. We must get the facts, talk to all parties involved and then draw our conclusion.

Solomon addresses this issue in Proverbs 18:13 "He that answereth a matter before he heareth it, it is folly and shame unto him." A lot of good people have been falsely accused and hurt because someone didn't take the time to gather the facts before they accused and condemned. If we base our conclusion on partial truth, we will get a false conclusion. Much of what goes around is nothing but gossip. We must be ethical in situations of this nature or we may hurt or ruin someone's character and reputation. We certainly would not want that to happen to us.

We need to be ethical in the hiring of other men who are working in another ministry. We owe it to the pastor/leader to let them know our intent and desire to talk with their employee. Respect for one another's ministry is vital and I

believe God honoring.

Another area of ethics where we fail often is in the area of church members, getting upset, leaving one church and going to another. It probably would be wise and helpful to a pastor to find out why they are leaving Church A and coming to Church B. It just might save them some trouble down the road. Is it right to leave a church mad and upset and a sister church take you in without making things right with the previous church?

I can remember at Faith

Church, Goldsboro, when we were going through some turbulent times, Brother Bill Bradley, pastor of Grace Baptist Church, would come over on Monday and give his visitor cards from Sunday to Brother Davenport to see if any of these were causing him any trouble. That impressed me. It's a good policy to follow.

I guess what we need to do in situations like this is to treat others right but also like we'd want to be treated. With some men, ethics is a one-way street. May that not be true with us.

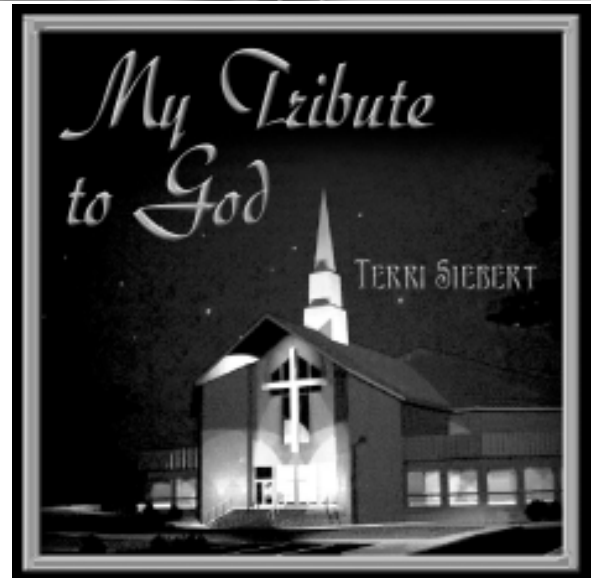

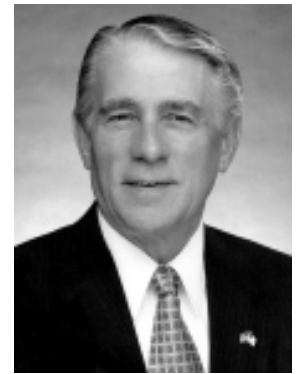

Missing Opportunities

When I was pastor of a church in a nearby city, I would have our people give their surplus clothes and food supplies to the Salvation Army for distribution to the needy. I did not do this because I had such a burden for the needy but so that I would not have to be bothered with the work involved in such a ministry. When the needy, and there seemed to be many of them, would come to our door for help I would send them to the Salvation Army and justify my conscience with the thought that our church had sent food and clothing to them for such purposes.

While preaching one Sunday Evening I was waxing eloquently against the liberalism of the day and how movements had compromised and I named the Salvation Army as an example of such a movement. I was bold in my denunciation of their social gospel and of their failure to preach a clear salvation message as had been the manner of their founder, the late William Booth. At the apex of my denunciation the Holy Spirit reminded me of my hypocrisy. He said, "at least, they have a heart for the poor and needy and are willing to work hard at meeting those needs. It is not that you don't recognize the responsibility to do so as is evidenced by your willingness to send them food and clothing. The problem is that you just don't want to be bothered with such a ministry."

Needless to say, I toned down my arrogant boldness and began asking the Lord to help me find the proper Scriptural balance and Biblical place for meeting social needs. I must say that this evolution of thought has been slow but visiting the mission field has helped me to better understand the Church's responsibility and great opportunity to use social vehicles as a means of opening hearts and

doors for the presentation of the gospel.

It is hard to get a hungry man to listen to a sermon about salvation and heaven as long as his belly is gnawing at his backbone. It is even harder to get him to see the love of Jesus when all we have for him is a track and a 45 minute message. But with the gift of food we can demonstrate the love of the message that we are presenting to him and through our compassion he can see the Savior's love. It is hard to get an unwed pregnant girl to listen to our message against abortion when we offer her no place to live and no help to care for her baby. It is hard to get a drunk or drug addict to listen to our message of condemnation of their sins when we offer them no help in their battle with these addictions. It is hard to get the ignorant to listen to why they ought to read their Bibles daily when they can't even read. It is hard to get the homeless to listen to the gospel message without some social vehicle that demonstrates the kindness and love of God.

Jesus went about doing good in order to demonstrate His deity and the compassion of God the Father for the sick, the grieving, the hungry, and the wayward. John 20:30, 31 "And many other signs truly did Jesus in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book: But these are written, that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through his name." What were some of the things that were written to convince men that He was the "Christ?" There was the story of the healing of the nobleman's son in John 4, and the feeding of the 5,000 in John 6, and the raising of Lazarus from the dead in John 11, and the healing of the impotent man in John 5, just to name a few. All of these were done by

Jesus, and John says they were done to reveal the deity of Christ in order that men "... might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing... might have life through his name." In other words, he used the social vehicles of healing the sick, feeding the hungry, and encouraging the grieving in order that men might listen to the gospel message concerning who He was and believe for salvation.

When Jesus sent the twelve out in Luke 9:1, 2; He said they were to, "...cure diseases... preach the kingdom of God, and to heal the sick." When He sent the seventy out in Luke 10:9; He said they were to, "... heal the sick that are therein, and say unto them, The kingdom of God is come nigh unto you.

Do we have any less of a command from our Lord and is there less need today and is not the method of Jesus as sound as the words of Jesus? I think

we all know the answer to these questions.

I fear that we as fundamentalist have missed many opportunities to demonstrate the compassion of Christ because we have neglected to use these and other social vehicles as a means of getting our verbal message to the millions who are in need. We have been so afraid that we would be seen as liberals that we have failed to use social means to open doors for our gospel message.

We must never allow the social aspect of our Biblical responsibility to replace the preaching of the gospel. This is what has happened to the Salvation Army. Nor should we continue to allow our unwillingness to get involved in these social ministries cause us to miss a great opportunity to demonstrate the character and compassion of our Lord that we so passionately preach. A piece of bread, a coat, or an education book will never save a man's

soul but they might very well open the door for us to present the Christ who can save the soul.

What can we do? I think there are three things that will help us as fundamentalist get back on track. I think God will empower us to more effective ministries if we will utilize these things.

1. Meditate through the Gospels again and let the social work and teaching of Jesus speak to our minds and hearts.

2 Minister to those He puts in our path as He would have ministered to them.

3 Manufacture ministries at home and abroad that will effectively meet needs and open doors for us to passionately present Christ through the preached Word.

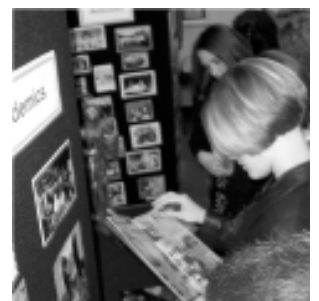
