

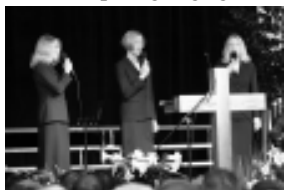


Camp Meeting—Another Great Year

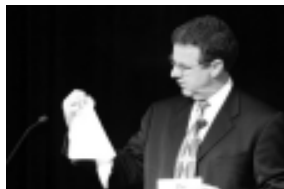


the atmosphere one of revival. We heard positive feedback from supporters and alumni alike about the conference. A layman from California said this was a great week

A TEACHER'S LOOK AT ROMANS 12

One of the hallmarks of SFWBC has been and continues to be her teacher education training. With an emphasis on professional skills and Biblical studies, our teachers leave Southeastern with a mind to teach and a heart to serve. A segment of Scripture that speaks volumes to those engaged in the ministry

of education is Romans 12. In it, one discovers a passage that could serve as a daily instruction manual for all who would seek to teach righteously. Viewing Romans 12 through the eyes of a teacher, we find three areas that play an important role in our daily lives.

1. My commitment to God.
2. My calling to teach.
3. My conduct among people.

First, verses 1 and 2 outline what our commitment is to be.

"I beseech you therefore brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world, but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable and perfect will of God."

The Christian life begins with the total commitment and presentation of our entire being, yet a daily sacrifice and commitment is necessary. Not a sacrifice of money, crops, or cattle, as in the Old Testament, but our bodies. What once was an instrument of sin (Romans 6), is now to be presented to God as a channel through which the

righteousness of God is manifested. Any teacher who wants to know God's will and wisdom both for their own self as well as their students must begin every day by presenting them-

selves to God as that "living sacrifice". In this process, the desires of our fleshly bodies are changed from conformation to the world to transformation toward Christ. As we daily renew the mind we can "prove" or "know" what the will of God is. God's will, of course, refers to His grand purpose for the life of every believer, yet it also implies His guidance and direction in all of life's decisions. How reassuring to know that we can go into the classroom armed with God's wisdom and direction for the day. The teacher that wants to discern the will of God must be committed to walking in the Word of God.

Secondly, verses 3 - 8 instruct the teacher in their calling. A teacher is by nature one who instructs others. Verse 7 speaks to teachers particularly in the exercise of their gift of teaching. "... or he that teacheth, on teaching" (or, "let him teach"). Two dangers that teachers face are an overestimation or underestimation of their God-given gift. Both however are rooted in the sin of pride. In his commentary surrounding these verses, Matthew Henry points out that,

"If we duly thought about the powers we have, and how far

we fail properly to improve them, it would humble us. But as we must not on the one hand be proud of our talents, so we must take heed lest, under a pretense of humility and self-denial, we are slothful in laying out ourselves for the good of others."

What these verses are really saying is that God has gifted us with the ability to do certain things, therefore if it is teaching, we should make all the necessary provisions to do it well. This follows a number of other related Scriptures including, I Cor. 10:31, "that whether we eat or drink or whatsoever we do, do all to the glory of God".

Finally, we are instructed on how to conduct ourselves in our interactions with others. For those that teach, these include direct commands that, if followed, will have a great impact on three groups of people: our students, our co-workers and our authorities.

With regard to students, verses 9 and 16 have particular importance. (v.9) Let love be without dissimulation. Abhor that which is evil; cleave to that which is good. (v.16) Be of the same mind one toward another. Mind not high things, but condescend to men of low estate. Be not wise in your own conceits.

Students of almost any age are particularly skilled at seeing motives. Pretense is easily picked up on and likely to be ill-received. Verse 9 has the idea to not just pretend that we love others, but to really love them. This type of love is not depen-

dent on reciprocation. Verse 16 has the idea of not trying to act important, but enjoying the company of ordinary people as well as not thinking you know it all! How often has real love (a love that many students do not receive at home) been a determining factor in a child's performance at school? We are commanded to love as Christ loved. This means loving in spite of the response received. Romans 3:23 explains how Christ did that for us when it says, "In that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us".

Another command that easily applies in dealing with students is found in verse 12, "...patient in tribulation; continuing instant in prayer". The most effective means of dealing with any situation, including tribulation is through prayer. The teacher that links these two character traits (patience and prayer) will prove to be a better, more effective disciplinarian in times of trouble.

With regard to a teacher's co-workers, some teachers may

find themselves working with some who are unfriendly to them personally or even to the gospel and their stand for Christ. In verses 14 and 15, Paul is specific about how to treat them. He says to, "bless them which persecute you: bless and curse not". He then takes it a step farther by stating, "Rejoice with them that rejoice, and weep with them that

weep". The implications here are obvious. How greatly would unity and interpersonal relationships at schools improve if every teacher lived according to these principles!

Lastly, in working with administrators and authorities, the Christian teacher should pay close attention to verses 11 and 17, which read, (v.11) Not slothful in business; fervent in spirit; serving the Lord; (v.17b) Provide things honest in the sight of all men.

It is always an administrator's joy to hire a teacher that is "not slothful in business" as verse 11 states. This quality is not always easily seen in an interview. To be sure, this quality has more to do with character than with talent. Paul reiterates this in verse 17 when he says, "...provide things honest in the sight of all men". Dr. Bob Jones said it this way, "Do right if the stars fall". John Wesley said of v. 11, "Doing all to God, not to man". It is that motive that is the key for the Christian teacher. If we are serving man only, we will be prone to be slothful, to let up and do less than our best when our superiors are not looking. If

though, we are serving God, we will be prone to serve Him with all our might in full commitment.

The daily life of the Christian teacher therefore, should begin and end with commitment - not to man, for that motive will fail, but to God. He alone will provide the direction, insight and character that we must have to impact student's lives for eternity.

We handed out tracts to everyone we came upon and I talked to them through the interpreters. ... My group went down a side street and came upon a father and his son...We approached the fence that surrounded their yard, introduced ourselves and asked them if we could have a few minutes of their time. The father and son approached the fence and we started visiting with them about God and eternity in Heaven....It was soon apparent that the son could speak English; he was learning how to read English in school. So I asked him to read the scripture verses, then I would explain each verse to them with Jon interpreting. You could see

the father start to understand and the Holy Spirit's power working in both of them. We came to the place where I asked them if they wanted to receive God's Greatest Gift, and they both said "yes". We prayed and they received Jesus as their Lord and Savior. Our hearts were full of joy and tears came upon all of us. It was then that I knew why God had sent me to Moldova. We approached many more people during our stay and others accepted Jesus Christ as their Savior.

I am thankful for the God's Greatest Gift program training I received at Medora Community Bible Church and Pastor Ward Smith of Parker, CO who created the flipchart. The training prepared me for soul winning at home and in Moldova. Why a Pastor Needs to Experience the Mission Field:

"In the nine years that I have been a pastor, I find myself getting hardened due to the stress of the ministry. There are a few things that help me keep my focus and encourage me to continue fighting the good fight such as Camp Meetings, Conferences, etc. The one thing that I seem to have the hardest time with is having a tear in my eye for people. This is a sad position for a pastor to be in. Two times I have had the privilege to go to the mission field, both in the Republic of Moldova. I

have come back both times with a renewed zeal to minister to my people and to evangelize the lost.

I have made it a practice in my ministry to use men in revival services who have been pastors at some point in their ministry. I believe they can preach to my people with the fire of an evangelist and the heart of a pastor, because they have experienced and dealt with the needs of a congregation before. I believe that a pastor can better relate the need for world missions to his people if he can speak from experience. They say that a picture is worth a thousand words, but a picture, slide presentation or a guest missionary can not convey the message the way that a pastor who has it burning deep in his heart from personal experience. Pastors, if you find yourself losing the tear from your eye or your church just doesn't seem to have the vision for world missions as it should, maybe you need to ask yourself this question, is the need for world missions burning in my heart the way it ought to be? If not maybe it's time you experience it for yourself. "Go Ye"

New Board of Directors Members Elected

At the April Camp Meeting the Cooperating Board Members elected two new Board of Directors members, Earl Hanna and Brian Phillips.

Earl Hanna

Bro. Hanna and his wife Bernice Hanna have been married for 45 years and have two children, a daughter-Gwendalyn Nelson who teaches at Ruth's Chapel Christian School in New Bern, NC. and a son-Terry Hanna who lives in Florence, SC and is employed by Honda Company.

Bro. and Sis. Hanna were both saved in 1965. Earl's brother Bun had witnessed to him and the Holy Spirit convicted him of his sins. While on the graveyard shift out behind the DuPont Plant where he worked, he asked the Lord so save him.

He started going to the Free Will Baptist Church where Norwood Gibson was the pastor. In 1970, he quit his job at DuPont and moved to Nashville, TN, to attend Free Will Baptist Bible College, hoping to come back home and be a good Sunday School teacher. God had other plans for Earl and called him to preach.

In 1973, he along with Bro. Johnny Pike took a small church in Middle, TN, where he pastored for 3 years. He moved to Trinity Free Will Baptist in LaGrange, NC in 1976, where he stayed for almost 8 years. He then moved to New Bern, NC, to pastor Ruth's Chapel for the next three years.

Earl moved to Orangeburg, SC, in 1986 as a Home Missionary to start a church there. He organized a church there and after building a building he moved back to Jacksonville, NC. to pastor First Free Will Baptist Church in 1993, where he is now pastoring. Bro. Earl is now the Moderator of the Coastal Association of Free Will Baptists.

He has been in a building program in each of the churches and is just about ready to move into a new 25,000 square foot building and hopes this is the last one. He is getting too old to be driving nails.

Brian Phillips

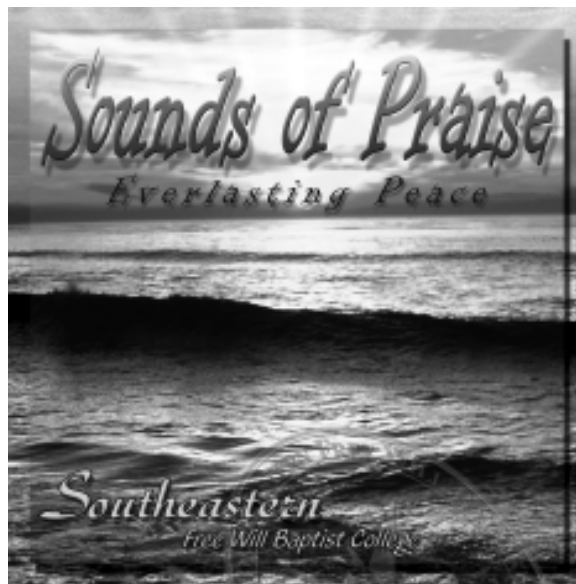
